### Podcasts:

- Teaching Hard History Presented by Learning for Justice: What we don't know about American history hurts us all. *Teaching Hard History* begins with the long and brutal legacy of chattel slavery and reaches through the victories of and violent responses to the civil rights movement to the present day. From Learning for Justice and host <u>Dr. Hasan Kwame Jeffries</u>, *Teaching Hard History* brings us the lessons we should have learned in school through the voices of leading scholars and educators. It's good advice for teachers and good information for everybody.
- Code Switch from NPR: What's CODE SWITCH? It's the fearless conversations about race that you've been waiting for. Hosted by journalists of color, our podcast tackles the subject of race with empathy and humor.
